Introduction and Methods

Survey Overview

The APTC Graduate Tracer Survey report summarizes feedback received from former students of APTC who have graduated from their respective programs six months to one year prior to the commencement of the survey. Data for the survey was collected through administration of the APTC Graduate Tracer Questionnaire. The previous Graduate Tracer Survey Report was produced in 2016 and included students who had graduated up to January 2016.

Students were identified for this survey based on their graduation dates. Methods of gathering data included:

- E-mail
- Postal services
- Personal interviews by visit
- Personal interviews by phone
- Online survey tool

The questionnaire used to gather data was divided into sections designed to collect information in the following areas:

- Current employment situation, including changes since graduating
- Students' APTC experiences
- Impact of APTC training on professional development, personal development and levels of income and employment
- Suitability of APTC courses for their respective employment situations and industry in general

The tables contained in this report reflect responses from graduates who chose to provide feedback. Not every respondent answered every question in the survey.

Survey Administration and Feedback

The 2017 survey was administered between 13 February and 28 April 2017. The survey population consisted of 579 students who graduated between February and December 2016 (continuing from the cohort encompassed by the Graduate Tracer Survey 2016).

Difficulties encountered in the administration of the survey throughout the Pacific were compounded by the changing residential circumstances of many students, and the inability to contact graduates residing in remote locations.

The table below details the survey population by citizenship and the number received as a percentage of the total surveyed.



68% of the employed graduates were in full time employment, 17% reported being unemployed and 11% were in part time employment.

The remaining 4% were in full and part time work or undertaking unpaid employment at the time of the survey.

On average, females were four times more likely to be working in unpaid employment than males.

The majority of graduates were employed by private companies (57%), followed by those who worked in public or government organisations (21%). 18% either worked in their own business or were employed by NGOs. The remaining 4% were either doing unpaid community or voluntary work or looking for work/more work.

Most of the graduates (41%) worked for small businesses with a single location, 39% worked for medium sized businesses with several branches and 20% worked for multinationals.

59% of the employers of the APTC graduates were based in the capital cities of their respective countries, 33% in villages or towns, with the remaining 8% in rural areas or outer islands.

The majority of females (67%) were employed in a capital city, while just over half (54%) of all males worked in a capital city, with another 39% of males working in a village or town.




Employment


Remuneration

A substantial proportion of respondents to the survey indicated that they were earning more one year after training than they were before training commenced.




Professional Development
